

Speech and language development is one of the most critical school readiness skills. Early identification is key: don't wait!

By 6 months	By 2 years
<ul> <li>Turns eyes or head toward a sound</li> <li>Watches your face when you speak</li> <li>Smiles &amp; laughs in response to your smiles &amp; laughs</li> <li>Makes sounds and/or moves body in response to you</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Follows 2 step directions</li> <li>e.g. "go find your teddy &amp; show it to grandma"</li> <li>Uses at least 100 words including action words</li> <li>e.g. fall, eat, go</li> <li>Combines at least 2 words e.g. daddy sleep</li> </ul>
By 9 months  Responds to his/her name Babbles e.g. bababa, dadada Enjoys playing social games with you e.g. peek-a-boo	<ul> <li>Enjoys being with other children</li> <li>Puts 2 pretend play actions together</li> <li>e.g. stirring food and feeding a doll</li> </ul> By 3 years
By 12 months  Follows simple 1 step directions e.g., "sit down" Gives familiar items on verbal request Points to things he/she wants Uses gestures e.g. waving "bye-bye" Looks across the room to something you point to Gets your attention using sounds, and gestures while looking at your eyes	<ul> <li>Understands who, what, where, and why questions</li> <li>Can create long sentences combining at least 5 words</li> <li>Uses some adult grammar e.g. mommy's coat, I jumped</li> <li>Can have a short conversation</li> <li>Speech is understood at least 75% of the time</li> <li>Pretends with friends using many actions e.g. having a tea party</li> </ul> By 4 years
By 18 months  Identifies several body parts when asked Understands the concepts of "in/out", "off/on" Points to pictures using one finger Uses about 20 words consistently to communicate Uses at least 4 consonant sounds e.g., p, b, m, n, d, g, w, h Pretends to feed a doll/teddy or pretends a bowl is a hat	<ul> <li>□ Follows 3 part directions         <ul> <li>e.g. "get some paper, draw a picture, &amp; give to mommy"</li> <li>□ Uses sentences with adult-type grammar</li> <li>e.g. "he's going to the park now"</li> <li>□ Tells a story</li> <li>□ Speech is understood by strangers most of the time</li> <li>□ Can act out different roles with their friends</li> <li>e.g. going to a restaurant</li> </ul> </li> <li>Adapted from Ontario Ministry of Children &amp; Youth Services, 2007</li> </ul>
