MINUTES

FIRST DAY

Council Chamber, Barrie, November 22nd, 1943.

The Council met pursuant to adjournment at the June Session. The Warden in the chair.

All the members were present except Councillor Lawrence. and Wray.

The minutes of the June Session, having been printed and distributed, were taken as read.

The Warden addressed the Council and reported that Councillor Lawrence would not be present at this Session as he was quite ill. He was satisfied that all the members hoped for an early recovery.

He stated that the general outlook of the war was better than at the time of the June Session, but he advised everyone to not be ctooly optimistic although he was looking for continued better war news as time goes by. He said that all branches of the service were giving a good account of themselves, and in this connection he was sorry to report that Councillor Curry had lost a son in Sicily. Heeextended the sympathy of the Council to the boy's parents and friends.

He was glad to report that the Fifth Victory Loan had been very successful over the whole County. In the five loans West Simcoe subscribed \$12,759,500 and East Simcoe \$9,804,650, making a total of \$22,564,150 for the whole County. He said this was an achievement of which we might justTy feel proud.

The crops throughout the County were rather disappointing this year and there wouldn't be sufficient grain for feed, but the Agricultural War Production Committee would present a report on this subject later in the Session.

Potato He stated that in the Alliston district a 500-bushel an Acre of Club had been organized and three farmers in that section had produced over 500 bushels per acre. This was a very creditable record and he doubted if it could be duplicated in any other part of the Province.

He was also glad to report that some fancy prices had been received by livestock producers in the County which shows that our farmers are doing their part in the war effort.

He requested the members to be punctual at all council and committee meetings and give their best attention to all the business placed before them.

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### SECOND DAY

Council Chamber, Barrie, Nov. 23rd, 1943.

The Council met pursuant to adjournment from yesterday's session. The Warden in the chair.

All the members were present except Councillors Lawrence and Wray. 1. The minutes of the last meeting of the Council were read and adopted. The Warden presented the following communications and accounts:

Communication from the Toronto General Hospital re liability for the payment of the hospital account of one Edward Alexander, a civilian employee at Camp Borden.

Communication from the Superintendent of the Alliston Hospital re the payment of Mrs. John Chapman's hospital account.

W. R. McVittie, Public School Inspector, addressed the Council on the question of a Health Service for the Public Schools. He gave a report of this service in Oxford County and pointed out the advantages of such a service. He stated that the first procedure would be for the County Council to appoint a Health Committee which would have charge of this matter. There was some discussion with reference to authority over parents in having their children examined.

The Warden thanked Mr. McVittie for his report and assured him that the Council would very carefully consider his proposal.

Councillor Banting asked for an explanation as to why the trees on the in Essa Twp. Mystery Farm, were being cut. He was informed by the Chairman of the Reforestation Committee that the trees were Scotch Pine which did not grow rapidly; it would take many years for them to be of any commercial value and he was informed that they would be replaced by other varieties of pine that had a much more rapid growth.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION

The Council met pursuant to adjournment at the morning session. The Warden in the chair.

The Warden explained that according to the report of the Special Centenary Committee, which was adopted by the Council, Mr. Smith, the architect, was present and would explain the proposed new entrance to the Court House. Mr. Smith explained his plans and presented a sketchest on the proposed entrance. Moved by Councillor Benson, Seconded by Councillor Yeo,

That the Council go into Committee of the Whole to consider plans for the proposed entrance.

The Council accordingly went into Committee of the Whole with Councillor Banting in the chair. The Committee of the Whole arose and reported that they would recommend that the Council endorse the recommendation of the Special Centennial Memorial Committee, namely, that a memorial entrance be made to the Court House, and that the idea of having pictures depicting the history of Simcoe County be included by the Committee as part of the memorial, the same to be left in charge of the present Memorial Committee.

Moved by Councillor Banting, Seconded by Councillor Buchanan, and ordered,

That the Report of the Committee of the Whole be adopted.

Major Mickleborough, Camp Borden, appeared before the Council and stated that there were a large number of civilians in the Alliston vicinity who worked at the camp. On different occasions last winter they were unable to reach the camp on account of the condition of the roads. He requested that these roads be kept snow ploughed and sanded this coming winter. Councillor Banting explained that these roads received first attention last winter but that on account of therextremely severe snow storms the roads weren't all that might be hoped for at all times.

County Engineer Jones explained that the first County Roads to be ploughed after a storm last winter were the ones in proximity to Camp Borden, but that the County was handicapped by the fact that Camp Borden pays higher wages for both men and trucks than the County can pay. Mr. Jones said he would give the matter the best attention possible.

Major Mickleborough stated he was satisfied that the County and the Camp could get together and work out a satisfactory solution.

The Council met pursuant to adjournment at yesterday's session. The Warden in the chair.

All the members were present except Councillor Lawrence.

THIRD DAY

The minutes of the last meeting of the Council were read and adopted. The Warden explained that a deputation from Flos Township wished to be heard by the Council, and he asked Deputy-Reeve Kidd to introduce the deputation. Mr. Father Doyle, Kidd introduced the deputation composed of David J. Kenney, Pat Donovan, P. A. Coughlin, Geräld Shanahan, Michael Kenney, Earl Wanless, Frank Hamill and Hugh Sexton.

Father Doyle addressed the Council and requested that the fourth concession of the Township of Flos be taken over as part of the County Road System. He stated that Phelpston, situated on this road, had a population of one hundred, and last winter at times it was impossible for them to get out and for doctors and others to get in. He made a strong plea that this road be taken over as part of the County Road System. The other members of the deputation endorsed Father Doyle's statements, and P. A. Coughlin, a former Deputy-Reeve of Flos, stated that this had been a County Road until 15 or 16 years ago when it had been taken off the System.

The Warden thanked the deputation and assured them that their request would receive the careful consideration of the Council.

David Smith appeared before the Council and presented a short report on the County Library Association. He stated that the work of the CAssociation by had grown so rapidly that Miss McPhee, the Barrie librarian, who had charge of the work, couldn't look after it. In order to give the best service to the County it was decided to engage a full-time librarian, and accordingly Miss Alberta Letts, who had good recommendations from Middlesex County, was engaged. Mr. Smith introduced Miss Letts who said she was pleased to meet the members of the County Council and report on her work since coming to the County two or three months ago. She stated that at the present time there are sixteen libraries in the County and two new ones anticipating becoming members shortly. There are still some parts of the County, particularly in the northern end of it, that arenit served with a library, but Miss Letts said she hoped to see the work extend so that in a short time the service of the County Library Association would be available to everyone in the County. She said she would be pleased to give any information she could to the members of the Council at any time. The Warden stated the Council were glad to meet Miss Letts, and thanked her for her

Councillor Benson, Reeve of Penetanguishene, stated that in looking over the list of roads to be improved and bridges to be built under the Five-Year Post War Plan he did not see Copeland's Bridge which is on a connecting link between the Town of Penetanguishene and the County Road in Tiny Township. The County Engineer explained that this bridge isn't on a County Road and accordingly it wasn't included in the list of roads or bridges to be taken care of, but he fully expected that the cost of it's construction would be looked after jointly by the Town of Penetanguishene, the Township of Tiny, the County and the Highways Department. The Engineer stated that the amounts named for the different roads and bridges mentioned in the report were only estimates as both wages and the price of material might change very greatly before the work is done. He further stated that some of the bridges mentioned in the report only needed new abutments, while in other places it would be necessary to erect new bridges. The Report was then declared adopted.

In referring to the report of the Memorial Centenary Committee on a County Scholarship the Warden explained that Ex-Warden C. D. Stewart and A. B. Cockburn of the Collegiate Institute staff expressed the desire to attend the November Session of the County Council to give any explanation that might be required in this connection,

Councillor Carlton reported for the Contingent Committee that a certain photographer had offered to take a picture of each member of the Council for \$75.00. This matter was left in the hands of the Contingent Committee.

<u>REPORT NO. 1</u> -- of the Special Agricultural War Production Committee was presented and read.

Moved by Councillor Banting, Seconded by Councillor Buchanan, and ordered,

That the Report now read be adopted.

Councillor E. J. Evans informed the Council that there were complaints about excessive speeding on the County Roads, and asked if the County Road Committee had considered placing policemen on these roads. It was pointed out that such policemen would have to be in uniform. Councillor Banting stated that the County Road Committee had considered this matter but had not taken any action on account of the cost. Councillor Asselin stated that excessive loading of trucks at certain seasons of the year was more destructive on roads than speeding.

Messrs. F. A. Lashley and S. L. Page, agricultural representatives for South and North Simcoe, reported on the work carried on this year in their respective areas.

Ir. Lashley stated that the grain crops in South Simcoe were the poorest harvested there in ten or fifteen years, and that the wet spring and late seeding were the greatest contributing factors. The hay, root and potato crops were good, although in some sections the bacterial ring-rot had affected the potatoes. As this disease was contagious the potatoes from affected fields were not allowed to be used for seed, but a supply of potatoes for planting next year was secured from the Lafontaine district in Tiny Township where the crops were free from disease. He said the poor grain crop would be reflected in certain lines of livestock production, especially hogs. Field crop tests were being carried on and tests made with new varieties of grains; improvements were also being made in production and grades of red clover seed. Mr. Lashley further stated that soil erosion was increasing rapidly on hillsides and soils on sloping ground, and that he would like to see a survey made of the soil in the County; it would be conducted by the Agricultural College at Guelph and would not cost the County very much. Mr. Lashley recommended that the Agricultural Committee undertake this project.

He stated that much useful work had been accomplished in the Junior Farmer activities in Boys and Girls Clubs, and the judging teams had made a very creditable showing. In this connection he said the grants from the County were of great assistance and were much appreciated. He referred to the farm labour problem which still existed although in many cases the assistance of boys and girls from the cities and towns and soldiers, particularly in the harvesting of fruits and vegetables, accomplished a lot. He also referred to the assistance given by the Farm Commando Brigades. Farmers' sons who were given military exemption because they were working on farms were allowed to engage in bush work or work in packing houses during the winter, provided they returned to farm work again when wanted.

Mr. Page stated that the work in the Agricultural Office had increased rapidly in recent years and was still increasing; the County committees were giving valuable assistance and they were all co-operating with the Departments. He said the results of the boys' and girls' work in North Simcoe had been quite satisfactory, and that out of a total of 76 members 57 projects had been completed. The Penetanguishene Swine Club, most of whose members were from the Perkinsfield section in Tiny Township, was very successful. There were 90 school girls who planted and cared for Victory Gardens, and the judges reported that all but four of them had creditable gardens. He referred to the problem of securing sufficient seed grain of satisfactory quality for 1944, but stated that a recent survey showed that there would be a sufficient supply if all the available grain could be used for seed purposes. According to a questionnaire sent out to the grain dealers in the County, 25% of whom had replied to date, there would be sufficient grain for seeding purposes. On account of the shortage of local coarse grains for feeding purposes a large number of brood sows had been marketed, although surveys showed that beef cattle were about normal and dairy cattle were holding up fairly well. Mr. Page stated that a survey also showed that a sufficient quantity of seed potatoes would be available for 1944 in Tiny, Flos, Oro and Medonte where 37,000 bushels of Certified No. 1 potatoes and a quantity of two grades better than No. 1 had been grown. The Farm Mechanics Course conducted last year had proved very satisfactory, and it was decided that they be held again this year and reach centres that weren't touched last year. He stated that arrangements were being made for community meetings in thirty different centres to convey to farmers the henefit of the agricultural offices. Mr. Page strongly recommended that all farmers' sons, who were needed on the farms for the winter, remain there; but if they could be spared for bush work or to work in packing plants they might go there for the winter, and by returning to the farm next spring their military exemption could be extended.

The Warden thanked the agricultural representatives for their very complete reports.

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Messrs. C. D. Stewart and A. B. Cockburn addressed the Council on the subject of a scholarship for High School Entrance pupils on examinations on the early history of Simcoe County.

Mr. Stewart stated that the knowledge of the early history of the County was collecting forgotten and on account of the older residents passing on, and it was important that the younger generation be taught and given instruction on its early history, It was reported that the Public School Inspectors were of the opinion there would be no difficulty in conducting the necessary examinations. He stated that the idea of plimiting the project to ten years, with the possibility of it being renewed, seemed advisable, and the principalfund would always be an asset to the County. Mr. Stewart suggested that the question be left in the hands of the Committee with the privilege of changing the plans for the scholarship each year. He also suggested that a contribution be made to the Barrie Collegiate Institute which is establishing a University Scholarship for deserving and needy students. The Collegiate is also celebrating its centennial.

Mr. Cockburn of the Barrie Collegiate staff and chairman of its Scholarship Committee strongly endorsed the historical scholarship which would extend to and benefit all parts of the County. The fact that the pupils would discuss at home what they were taught in school would be a great educating factor. Mr. Cockburn endorsed Mr. Stewart's statements and made a strong plea for assistance from the County for a collegiate scholarship, as it would benefit needy students. The Report of the Special Centennial Memorial Committee, which was laid on the table Moved by Councillor Hartman, at a former session, was then adopted.

That the Legislation Committee consider recommending to the Attorney General that a resident magistrate be appointed for the Town of Midland and surrounding district.

WHEREAS the County of Simcoe in its Centennial Year can point with pride to the development of the County and its many worthwhile achievements and a great deal of outstanding progress, which this Council wishes to acknowledge; yet in one major respect we find, at the end of one hundred years, the natural fertility of the soil in many parts of the County has been depleted to an alarming extent with a considerable acreage already deteriorated beyond any usefulness as farm land and other large areas moving rapidly in that direction,

IT IS HEREBY requested that the Warden appoint a small committee to make a preliminary investigation and report on a Post War Soil Conservation and Land Utilization Programme for the County of Simcoe and report at the next Session. Moved by Councillor Richardson, Seconded by Councillor Eplett, and ordered,

That Councillor Cumming be granted leave of absence to-day as he is attending a farmers' meeting in Toronto.

Moved by Councillor Banting, Seconded by Councillor Buchanan,

That the Simcoe County Home Committee consider the advisability of providing some hospitalization accommodation in the Simcoe County Home. After considerable discussion the motion was declared lost on a show of

hands.

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
