M I N U T E S OF THE JUNE SESSION, 1949, OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE COUNTY OF SIMCOE

FIRST DAY

Council Chamber, Barrie, June 13th, 1949.

The Council met pursuant to adjournment at the January Session.

The Warden in the chair.

All the members were present

The minutes of the January Session, having been printed and distributed, were taken as read.

The Warden, in addressing the Council, expressed his pleasure at seeing the members looking so pleasant and healthy, but he was of the opinion that if the injurious effects of the drouth were as bad as reported many of them might not be able to create a smile. He referred to the Warden's address to the Council in the minutes of the June Session, 1941, when George Barr, who was Warden at that time, said the effects of the continued drouth would be damaging to the farmers although the recent rain might, to a certain extent, improve conditions.

In going over the County Road System with the County Road Committee and Engineer he had the opportunity to see the extent and size of the County, which he had previously not had the privilege of doing, and found that the County Roads for the most part were in fairly good shape, but he informed the Council that very little hard surfacing had been done and that in the very near future larger sums would have to be spent on the County Road System to keep the roads on a par with similar roads in the Province.

Since the January Session the County had lost a very effecient official in the person of Frank Hammond, Crown Attorney, who had given very satisfactory service in that position. However, he was succeeded by W. M. Thompson of Penetang, who had been a former member of this Council and had also been mayor of his town.

The Special Committee which had been appointed to make arrangements for setting up a Juvenile and Family Court had secured the services of Mr. Frank Dingman as Probation Officer; he was already in the County getting acquainted, but the active work of the Court would not commence until July 1st.

He regretted to have to report that Miss Audrey Gray, County Librarian, had resigned and was accepting a position in her home city of London; the County was losing a very efficient librarian.

He informed the Council that the annual Warden's Picnic would be held at Springwater Park on the afternoon of Wednesday, June 15th, but that its form would be diffJune 13th, 1949.

erent from former years as it would be a basket pinnic; he trusted as many families in the County as possible would attend and bring their picnic baskets.

He welcomed Ex-Warden George Patterson back to the County after his visit last winter to his homeland, and said he would call on him later to address the Council. Communications

The Warden stated that just recently the County Engineer had been obliged to close one of the longer bridges in the County to public traffic as it was getting very much out of repair, and he asked Mr. Jones to report on its condition.

The County Engineer reported that the Clerk of Flos advised him that a couple of stringers on this bridge were broken; he examined it within a few hours and found two broken and two otherscracked. In his opinion it was not safe for publik travel and closed it. He estimated that it would cost between \$7,500 and \$10,000 to repair it, and then it would only be good for two or three years. He had gone to Toronto and consulted the Chief Bridge Engineer of the Department of Highways, who advised him that The Municipal Act provided that in such cases the repairing of the old bridge or the erection of a new bridge would have to be commenced within a reasonable time. Mr. Jones informed the Council that in his opinion a new bridge would cost approximately \$80,000, and that the County would have to provide its share, would be 20%, the Department paying the other 80%. If the County decided to erect a new bridge a supplementary by-law would have to be passed for the estimated cost of the bridge and sent to the Department of Highways for approval.

A number of questions were asked and satisfactorily answered by the Engineer.

A number of the members of the Standing Committee on Education of Victoria County were in the chamber, and they were heartily welcomed by the Warden. Their Chairman briefly addressed the Council and stated that they had been to the School Boards of Orillia and Barrie regarding High School Districts.

The Warden invited Ex-Warden Patterson to a seat on the dais and to address the Council.

Mr. Patterson said he was pleased to be back among his many friends, but that he had a very enjoyable trip to his native country which he had left 43 years ago; he had only been back once since that time for a very short visit about 30 years ago, during the First World War. He said no particular damage was done to the section around his old home during the recent war; it was good agricultural land and the farmers farmed it very intensively. He had a good passage going over on the Empress of France, a C. P. R. boat which sailed from Port St. John in New Brunswick. It was a fine way to travel and took about six days to reach Liverpool, and from there he travelled by rail to his old home; although the railways were nationalized he found the accommodation and meals very satisfactory. The British are wonderful people, and although food is still rationed the farmers as a whole are not in too bad shape for in many cases they grow much of their own vegetables and meats, and the Government subsidizes to the extent of £3 \$10 all new born calves. The holiday had been good for him and he was feeling a lot better. He saw more of his homeland on the trip than he did during his early life for at that time the horse and buggy was the chief means of transportation, but now they travel by motor car. When he left here the County gave him a good sendoff, and it stood him in good stead. He presented the Warden with a message from the Mayor of Newcastle to the Warden and Members of Simcoe County Council.

The Warden read this message and thanked Mr. Patterson for his address and for the message from the Mayor; he said the Council were very pleased to accept the message and assured him that it would be acknowledged.

June 13th, 1949.

C. D. Raikes, Weed Inspector for North Simcoe, addressed the Council and regretted the illness of J. H. Dunn, Inspector for South Simcoe, who was undergoing a critical operation in Toronto to-day. He offered to assist in Mr. Dunn's territory in any way he could be of service. He referred to a Weed Conference in Toronto where reports were made on the results of spraying corn at Ridgetown Experimental Station where corn was sprayed up to six inches high without any injury to it but which resulted in the destruction of all weeds; he stated that if this spraying became general it would be a great boon to the corn-growing in North Simcoe this year areas. He had held six meetings on the subject of the destruction of weeds, with the result that he had 150 requests for information on weed control; he had had good co-operation from the Chep Improvement Association. He stated that buckhorn could be destroyed by spraying with 2-4 D. Certain experiments will be conducted on the farm of George Graham at Eady for the destruction of weeds in a clover field. There will be Junior Farmers contests in North Simcoe this year on clean farming, and they will be judged on weed control.

The Warden thanked Mr. Raikes for his address and his offer to assist in Mr. Dunn's area during his illness.

The Warden read an invitation to this Council to visit the Councils of Peel and Halton Counties on Thursday, June 16th.

He stated that with the picnic and tour, if the members decided to go, the week would be shortened, and suggested that any resolutions to Council be presented as early in the week as possible and that the committees make all possible progress with their reports. Moved by Councillor Taylor,

The Council met pursuant to adjournment at yesterday's session.

The Warden in the chair.

All the members of the Council were present.

The Warden presented the following communications:

Request from Miss Anne Middleton, Secretary to the County Assessor, for an increase in salary.

Reply from C. A. McDonald, representative for the United Emergency Fund for Britain, advising that he would attend to-day's session of the Council.

Communication and petition from the Secretary of the Cookstown Branch of the Canadian Legion with regard to purchasing the old lock-up grounds in Cookstown.

Communication from D. H. Coleman, County Treasurer, with reference to an account of \$136.30 for the inquest of Edward O'Hara.

The Warden informed the Council that Mr. McDonald, representing the United Emergency Fund for Britain, was in the Council Chamber, and he called on him to address the Council. Mr. McDonald explained the purposes of the organization he represented and stated that some 5,000 different organizations across Canada were sending food parcels to Britain. Some 30,000,000 parcels were sent annually and it took at least 25% of their value for transportation. One of the purposes of his organization was to co-ordinate this voluntary effort so that it would take less for transportation and leave more to be distributed among the people in Great Britain. He stated that approximately 7,000,000 Christmas parcels, averaging 15 lbs., were sent to Britain from Canada in 1948, and the postage on each parcel averaged \$1.50. These parcels might be buiked and shipped by freight in car lots, and by so doing Britain had agreed to pay part of the shipping cost. He requested each community to set up committees to work with the U. E. F. B., and suggested that the Council consider giving a grant to assist in this work.

The Warden assured Mr. McDonald that his request would have the serious consideration of the Council.

The Warden then announced that Dale Miller of Medonte Township, winner of the Public Speaking Contest for the Province of Ontario which was held in Toronto at the time of the annual convention of the Ontario Education Assocation, would deliver the address he gave at that time, and requested Councillor B. Miller, Reeve of Medonte Township, to introduce him to the Council. Councillor Miller stated that it was a pleasure for him to introduce a resident of Medonte who had won such distinction.

After the address the Warden called on Councillor Hunter, who congratulated Dale on his splendid achievement and presented him with a wrist watch, the gift of the Council.

The Warden then congratulated Dale and informed him that in his opinion he would be heard of in the future in the legislative halls of the Province and perhaps of the Dominion.

June 14th, 1949.
